The Reverend Dr. Michael L. Mitchell was the worship leader for the 69th Annual Convention Worship Service on Tuesday evening. The procession- al was led by St. Stephens A. M. E. Church Mass Choir, Episcopal Dis- trict Officers, Conference Officers, the Reverend Clergy and program participants. The processional song was appropriate for the service as all in attendance sang and marched to the tune of “We are Marching in the Light of God.”

Our capable, efficient, erudite and proficient President, Charlie Nichols, sounded the call of the official opening of this 69th session of the Episco- pal District Lay Organization in the coastal city of Jacksonville, Florida.

The call was answered by the many loyal lay members across this expansive district inclusive of the Commonwealth of the Bahamas who pledged to continuously show love, harmony, and unity, as we actively and intentionally take on the attrib- utes of the fruits of the spirit as pro- vided in the book of Galatians.

Bishop Richardson expounded on the three books with continued authority and meaning within the church.


