YAR TRAINING SESSIONS

YAR, Jai Ingraham and the registered youth and young adults of the 67th Annual Convention held training sessions concurrently with the Adult Program.

Today's Training Sessions dealt with the following: 1) "The WORD of Prayer;" 2) "The WOR-SHIP in Music;" and 3) "The WIT-NESS OF Our Service."

Though there was a limited number of Youth and Young Adults registered as delegates for the Convention, nevertheless the discussions were lively. The WORD of Prayer session was conducted by Jon Ingraham and began with his asking all attendees to draw a line down the middle of the paper; one side titled "What I want to Do (in my lifetime) and the other side, "What God wants me to Do." He gave 30 seconds for listing items that God wants and 20 seconds listing What "I" want. Needless to say the "I" want side listed more items than the God wants side. He then explained that it always appears that we readily know what we want out of or from life as opposed to knowing what God wants, or better yet our knowing the things that are pleasing to God. Four adult delegates to the Convention were part of this Training Session. A lively dialogue ensued regarding some of the life choices that

life choices that we've made. The session concluded with prayer.

Sometimes, in the emotion of the moment, our minds play tricks on us. We think our loss is worse than it is. We may feel like the songwriter David who, in the confusion of the moment, thought God had forgotten him.

When David later recalled what he knew rather than what he feared, his sense of loss turned into a song of praise (Ps. 13:5-6). His renewed joy foreshadowed what is now ours to recall: Nothing can rob us of what is most important if our life is "hidden with Christ in God." (Col. 3:3).

Disappointed because you have not broken into the more elite group in your church or neighborhood? Stuck down on rung two (2) when you'd rather be on rung eight (8) or at least climbing the social ladder? Listen to what Jesus said: "Whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted" (Luke 14:11). That's the radical and upside-down way of God's kingdom! The hope we read about in Scripture is not vague, wishy-washy optimism. Instead biblical hope is a strong and confident expectation that what God has promised in His Word He will accomplish. Tribulation is often the catalyst that produces perseverance, character, and finally, hope (Rom. 5:3-4).

The word gospel means "good news." The gospel of Christ is that God Himself loved us enough to send His own Son into this world to rescue us from ourselves and our sin (John 1:1-4; 3:16).

The good news is that Jesus lived the quality of life that God intended for us to live. Without flaw, He loved His heavenly Father with all of His heart, soul, and mind. Without fail, He showed us what it means to love our neighbor as ourselves.

Then, to solve the problem of our lost relationship with His Father, Jesus died in our place, offering Himself as a perfect sacrifice to pay the price of sin. Because He was not only man but God our Creator as well (John 1:1-14), His death was of infinite value. When He rose from the dead, He proved that He died in our place to pay the price of all sin—past, present, and future. With one sacrifice, He paid for the least—and the worst—of our sin.

Father in Heaven, we thank you for this 67th Convention, for the leaders of this Episcopal District, for willing workers, delegates and participants. We come humbly asking You to forgive us of our sins. We have sometimes ignored Your commands. We waste precious time doing unproductive things that we could have spent working for You. Help us focus on and obey Your commands. We know You have called us to specific work within the church. Reveal to each of us how to accomplish Your will so by faith we can move forward. In Jesus' Holy Name, Amen. Amen, and AMEN!


