

The Class and Class-Leaders

Mr. John W. Love Director of Lay Activities

1. What are class-leaders in the African Methodist Episcopal Church? They are sub-pastors and as such are appointed by the preacher in charge. The mini

They are sub-pastors, and as such are appointed by the preacher in charge. The minister is bound to take heed of all the flock over which the Holy Ghost has made him/her overseer, and to enable him/her to discharge this duty the more effectively, the leader is a proxy-pastor.

2. What should be the qualifications of class-leaders?

They should be of deep personal piety, mature experience, ability to give religious counsel and advice, wisely and affectionately, and to influence the members, young and old, to the systematic discharge of their Christian duties. They should be well versed in the Discipline of the church and the Bible.

3. Who instituted the class-leaders? *John Wesley, at the very birth of Methodism.*

4. How many members are allowed to a leader? *Twelve (12)*

5. What is the duty of class-leaders?

To see each person in his/her class once a week at least, in order, first, to inquire how their souls prosper; second, to advise, reprove, comfort or exhort, as occasion may require; third, to receive what they are willing to give to the church.

To meet the ministers and stewards of the society once a week, on order, first, to inform the minister of any that are sick, or of any that walk disorderly and will not be reproved; second to pay the stewards what they have received from their several classes in the week preceding.

6. What should a leader infer when he/she meets his/her class and finds a member absent? *That the member is sick, or dead, or has been unexpectedly summoned away from home or that there is indisposition in the family, for every good Methodist will endeavor to be as class.*

7. Who shall examine the class-leaders concerning their gifts and usefulness? The pastor in charge should do it in the Official Board at his/her pleasure. But the Presiding Elder should always make it a part of his/her Quarterly conference duties, though he/she may only have time to examine two or there.

8. What portion of the Discipline, of all others, should a class-leader be most familiar with? *The twenty-five (25) Articles of Religion*

Day of Sharing, Local Ministry Ordination & Deaconess Consecration Service Saturday, December 3, 2011

The genesis of the Day of Sharing in the 11th Episcopal District can be traced back to the time Bishop Frank Curtis Cummings arrived in the 11th Episcopal District from his assignment in the 1st Episcopal District. In the 1st District, they had a gathering in December as a form of a "Helps Ministry." Upon arrival in the District, Bishop Cummings encountered Presiding Elder J.H. Blake of the then South Florida Conference. Presiding Elder Blake had a desire to see a gathering whose goal would be to help and assist widows of the church. Elder Blake made the case for this idea as a "helps ministry" to bring people together showing love and support, and in a real and tangible way, demonstrate to the recipients that they have not been forgotten. The first Day of Sharing series held in the District was held at or around Christmas of 1993, and the initial Day of Sharing is believed to have taken place at Bethel AME Church, Pompano.

Later, under the leadership of Bishop John Hurst Adams, beginning in 2001, the Ordination of the Local Deacons and Elders, as well as the Consecration of Deaconesses were removed from the site of the Annual Conferences and added to the respective Conferences' Annual Day of Sharing.

This year in the Florida Conference, over \$23,000/00 was collected for this unselfish act of sharing. Bishop McKinley Young delivered a powerful sermon entitled "We Came to Worship". Bishop Young emphasized the fact that you can not truly worship unless you bring the right kind of gift. He made it known that if you continue to go to church each Sunday and leave the way you came in you are wasting God's time. As the proclaimer of the Word during his last Day of Sharing, Bishop Young admonished the worshippers to start over again and not let another year go by without working and studying.

Bishop Young delivered a penetrating Word that pierced the soul of all individuals in attendance.

January is Cervical Health Awareness Month

What is Cervical Health Awareness Month?

The United States Congress designated January as Cervical Health Awareness Month. During January, you may wish to highlight issues related to cervical cancer, HPV disease and the importance of early detection. Some of the issues you may wish to highlight are personal stories of women and family members/ caregivers battling issues related to their persistent HPV/pre-cancer and/or cervical cancer. You may wish to highlight recent ad-

vances and research in the prevention, detection and treatment of cervical cancer or HPV. You can highlight the success of your local/state/ national early detection cervical cancer screening and treatment programs and human-interest stories on the importance of early detection, education and the emotional issues related to battling cervical cancer and HPV.

AND.....KNOW THE FACTS:

□ Cervical cancer is the 5th most common cancer in women worldwide with approximately 471,000 new cases diagnosed each year. It's sobering to think that a woman dies of cervical cancer approximately every 2 minutes.

□ In less developed countries, this type of cancer is the second most common in women and accounts for up to 300,000 annual deaths. 80% of the cases occur in low-income or middle-income countries.

Cervical cancer is the most common cancer for women in Central America and Southern Africa. The Caribbean, other parts of Africa, South America and south Eastern Asia also have very high incidences of this disease. Unfortunately, many women from these areas don't have access to routine exams such as pap smears.

□ Although the average age of diagnosis is 50, women as young as 17 can contract the disease.

The western journal of medicine has published an informative online article entitled «cervical cancer in the developing world» .

What Can You Do?

As someone who is interested in educating and advocating for increased knowledge of cervical cancer and HPV disease, you can do a lot. Motivation is the key, that, and the willingness to make contacts with local media. As part of a nation-wide education effort surrounding Cervical Health Awareness

Month, we are asking that national, state and local supporters of the NCCC mobilize to get the word out about cervical cancer and HPV.

How Can You Gain the Media's Interest?

State and local media are firmly committed to making the news they report relevant to their readers. In other words, they like to report what's happening in the neighborhoods they serve.

Strive to introduce elements of local interest to your story "pitch." There are a number of simple ways this can be achieved, just be creative.

Some examples include:

Make available local cervical cancer survivors for interviews. Local human interest
"angles" are always popular with reporters, and their readers or viewers
