

Florida brags of bearing good fruit... and **Jesse L. Burns** was evidence of that. Zeroing in on his work in the Connectional Lay Organization, I thank God for his belief that mustard seed faith was enough. As the 10th President of the Connectional Lay Organization, serving for six years, furthering the mission was accomplished via the Brown-Williams Mentoring **Program** and "Envision 5,000" – a membership growth plan. The business sessions were enhanced with a "swat force" called the Executive Team producing **Action Summaries** to give delegates an outline of action items to implement back at the local church. In 2005 - the "Black **Tie Affair**" – a Presidential reception, along with a concert served to raise funds to support selected AME colleges and schools (\$50,000 at the inaugural event). Administrative excellence happened with developing standards/procedures for the Nominating Committee in 2005 and the Budget Oversight Committee for real time budget monitoring. Of note, is his determination to respect the administration of former President James L. Williams, by making AMEV-Alert a "high" priority that honors the legacy of African Methodism. Global outreach led to an **African excursion to Johannesburg** in 2006. A social justice theme led to the first **AMEs On the Hill** in 2007 during the Biennial Convention in Washington, DC where the keynote speaker was the newly minted Speaker of the House, the Honorable Nancy Pelosi. In 2009, the T.A.A.G was introduced (Transition At A Glance) to provide each delegate with a complete record of transactions at the 29th biennial session. Jesse Burns prayed and walked out on faith believing in the power of prayer! I am grateful God ordained that our paths would cross and stay connected until death. In fact, on May 31st, in the midst of his health challenges, Bro Jesse planned and executed the first local Lay Day with a Connectional flavor in this COVID19 pandemic season at St Paul AME in Ocala with focus on Social Justice. He didn't have to do it, but he did – with excellence as only our friend and soldier of the cross would.

I will always remember **Jesse**, **my friend**, who never let you go through tough times without making sure you knew that he cared. A refreshing comment and offer to help kept you from wallowing in pity, only to have him redefine the problem bringing dignity to an obvious debacle. Later, when he reminded you that he had been "right," what could you do, but smile. Then, it was never mentioned again.

Jesse, thank you for modeling excellence in lay witness/lay ministry. Then "living while Black," you managed to love unconditionally. We have grabbed the baton to carry on, never letting your vision end until it is passed on... to continue the race you ran so well!

Mr. Jesse Q. Burns, Jr. - The Life

"Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I set you apart; Jeremiah 1:5

Marie Kinzy Burns in Bradenton, Florida. He departed this earthly life on September 16, 2020, at age 70, one day after the biblical promise of threescore and ten. He and his late sister Janice were raised in a household that held a firm belief in "God our Father, Christ our Redeemer, Holy Spirit our Comforter and Humankind our Family." The African Methodist Episcopal Church was both his foundation and springboard.

Jesse always stayed true to his AME heritage. Reared in Ward Temple AME Church Bradenton, Florida, in 1968, Mrs. Marie Burns and her children Jesse and Janice, moved their membership to St. Stephen AME Church in Bradenton, where her husband was already a member. It was in St. Stephen that Jesse accepted the Lord as his Savior, and began his very active life as a churchman. He found his niche as a member of the Young People's Division (YPD) and later went on to become YPD President at both the Conference and Episcopal District level. It was also in St. Stephen where he met and came under the tutelage of local lay president Mrs. Jessie Pryor and began his monumental journey in the organized Lay Organization.

Later in life as he resided in different places, he always stayed connected with the AME Church. Jesse L. Burns, Jr. worshipped wherever he lived and wherever he lived, he served. He became a member of Greater Bethel AME Church, Gainesville, Florida, and St. John AME Church where he served as steward, treasurer, and chairman for the Commission on Stewardship and Finance. At the time of his death he was a member of Saint Paul AME Church in Ocala where he was actively engaged as a steward, musician, local lay president, and church school teacher.

It was in the church where Jesse received his first and most lasting training. It was in the church where he experienced some of his most profound blessings. A delegate to the General Conference since 1976, Jesse served as a member of the General Board in 1976 and 1988. Additionally, he was a member of the Episcopal Committee in 1976, 1980, 1984 and 2000.

Always an ardent lay person, he rose through the ranks to its highest office, being appointed as the Connectional Lay President in 2003 after the death of Connectional President Arthur Brown and elected to the position in 2005. As a precursor, he served as local lay president at St. Stephen A.M.E. Church in Bradenton, Florida, president of the Ft. Myers District Lay Organization and president of the Eleventh Episcopal District Lay Organization. At the Episcopal level he rearranged the committee system, spearheaded successful membership recruitment drives, established the Episcopal District Lay Organization Economic Development fund and reactivated the Bahamas Conferenced Lay Organization. He has left a pathway strewn with accomplishments and contributions that will be long held and heralded as exemplars for years to come. Under his watch the first Connectional Lay Summit/Retreat was held in Orlando, FL, in 2004, and the Brown-Williams Mentoring Program was instituted. Jesse spearheaded a task force to rewrite the Lay Study Guide.

Educated in the public schools of Manatee County in Bradenton, Florida, Jesse went on to become a graduate of Stetson University with a degree in Business Administration and later St. Petersburg College Program of Mortuary Science. His past employment history includes time as the Director of Human Resources for Tropicana Products, Inc., the multinational company that specializes in the production of orange juice in Florida. His civic affiliations include being a life member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., life member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and a member of 100 Black Men.

Mr. Jesse L. Burns, Jr. will be sorely missed by those who loved him, yet remembered as a stalwart Layman Soldier, strong in unity and love. Those who remain to celebrate his transition include his church family, dear friend, Mrs. Marie Dixon Jones, extended family members: Sarah Burns Davis, Dorothy Burns, Clinton Burns, and many sorrowing friends and fellow laypersons.
