The Scriptural Reference: Luke 4: 18-19

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.

Living a Global Witness Ministry means that we intentionally, on purpose, in an unabashed way, in a public way, in a relational way, desire to bring witness that is different, daring, innovative, engaging and liberating.

We serve a church that spans 39 countries, 5 continents, speaks countless languages, is governed by democracy, aristocracy, monarchy amid a plethora of cultures and yet believes in **THE SAME GOD**. We are separated by miles, resources, agendas, political interests and for the past 18 months we can add pandemic to the mix of reasons that we are apart. We have been kept together through the innovation of technology, the willingness to transform to a different way of thinking and worshiping and witnessing. We have had to transcend the usual way of doing things so that all could be privileged to a liberating gospel. We as the Organized Lay Organization have had to step up and be demonstrative of the outcomes we are desirous of seeing. In other words, Living A Global Witness Ministry That Transforms, Transcends and Liberates is where our mission rests.

Living A Global Witness Ministry that Transforms is real life ministry. Everybody seems to be using the word "transformation" to describe the impact of what they are doing. There is transformational leadership, transformational management, transformational development, transformational business, transformational care, transformational learning, transformational marketing!

As we continue to use the term to describe our Christian ministries, we should be clear about what we mean when we use it. The Biblical concept of transformation flows from an intensely personal relationship with God. Living A Global Witness Ministry that Liberates frees one to be liberal in praise, in service and witness. The gospel is a message of freedom and liberation — the ministry of Jesus was that of liberating captives.

The gospel tells us that it is through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit that we can courageously leave our comfort zones to reach, teach, preach and serve others just like Christ did in the synagogues. And so we shall by Living a Global Witness Ministry that Transforms, Transcends and Liberates.

Worshippers charged to 'speak life' into A.M.E. Church

The 78th Annual Eleventh Episcopal District Lay Organization Convention kicked off on Tuesday, June 21 with an exciting night at the Greater Bethel A.M.E. Church in Gainesville, Florida.

Eleventh District Presiding Prelate Bishop Frank Madison Reid III served as the evening's messenger and delivered a word from Proverbs 18: 21 titled "It's a Matter of Life or Death."

Bishop Reid spoke to current situations in the A.M.E. Church including the pension fund discrepancy. He encouraged the crowd of more than 300 worshippers to stop the infighting in congregations and organizations and start speaking life into the church for "death and life are in the power of the tongue." Reid said a vocabulary of lifegiving words is truthful, trustworthy, transforming, comforting and conquering. "All God has to do is speak a word to revive the A.M.E. Church," Bishop Reid said.

During the two-hour worship experience, the crowd was blessed with selections from the powerful East Conference Choir and a soul-stirring liturgical dance performance from EEDLO Young Adult Representative Ashley Blakely.

East Conference Lay Organization President Nicholas Causey welcomed his guests from around the Episcopal District to the convention, thanking all his supporters. "[The East Conference is] not going to stand to the side, we are taking over with you Bishop," Causey joked.

Executive Board dedicates retreat proceeds to 2023 registration costs

The Eleventh Episcopal District Lay Organization Executive Board met at the Female Protection Society of Gainesville on Tuesday for a business meeting.

EEDLO President Patricia H. Wright presented a plan to support mem-

bers in attending the Connectional Lay Organization Biennial in Chicago and the EEDLO Convention at the Atlantis Resort in Nassau, Bahamas in 2023.

President Wright proposed that proceeds from the 2023 EEDLO

Virtual Retreat be used to pay registration costs for members attending from each conference. If 300 people register for the retreat, the EEDLO can support 24 people (four from each conference) to attend each meeting. The board voted unanimously to move forward with President Wright's proposal.

It also voted to continue the pursuit of 501(c)3 designation for the organization.

'The truth is told' at the LEDP breakfast

The Honorable Alachua County Court Judge Meshon T. Rawls gave her life to Christ in 1989, but it wasn't until 1994 that she learned that she needed to rely on the Lord in times of struggle.

Judge Rawls shared her testimony in her keynote speech at the annual Lay Economic Development Program breakfast at the Hilton-University of Florida Conference Center on Wednesday morning.

At age 22, her 2-month-old son had died of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, her marriage was on the rocks and she had a bachelor's degree but no job. A friend named Hope called her and encouraged Rawls to apply for law school, even though she didn't feel qualified. Rawls stepped out on faith, applied and received a scholarship. That experience reminded her of II Corinthians 1:8-9 and guided her message for breakfast attendees, "If the Truth Be Told." Paul let the people of Corinth know that being saved does not mean you will not face hardships, and that "It is okay to feel the pressure," Judge Rawls said. "It happened so that I know not to rely on myself. I have to rely on God."

Dr. Kevin Sharpe, a concert pianist from Mt. Olive A.M.E. Church in Gainesville, shared two selections "Love is in Need of Love Today" and "Wind Beneath My Wings," as guests ate.

The LEDP Board honored Joseph Coppock Jr. for his long service to the organization with an ovation during the event.

LEDP Secretary Reginald Robinson presided over the event and gave special recognition to Phyllis Filer for her dedicated work in coordinating the event.

Cotton Club Museum and Cultural Center helps preserve Gainesville's Black history

Sankofa is a principle derived from san, meaning to return; ko meaning to go; and fa meaning to fetch. Gainesville's The Cotton Club Museum and Cultural Center expresses this principal clearly.

Owned by a non-profit that originated in the Mount Olive A.M.E. Church, the CCMCC is unique in its story. Walking inside the prefabricated building allows visitors to "go back" to an earlier time when it was Perry Movie Theater, the Cotton Club, the Blue Note Club and a furniture warehouse.

Fast forward to 1995, when Dr. Vivian Filer was charged by her pastor to "go get" the space and re-imagine it. Filer serves as the executive director and chair of the not-for-profit corporation that preserves the historic site while creating a space that promotes and instills pride in the African-American culture.

Under the knowledgeable eye of Deloris Rentz, facilities coordinator, constituents of the EEDLO recently viewed exhibits including of elaborate gourds and Sankofa birds created by the-late Patricia Hilliard-Nunn,

their presence reminding us to drink up droplets of Black heritage. Additionally, "American Idols" portraits of music artists from Sade to Childish Gambino by artist Yvonne Ferguson lined the museum's walls.

"The air of pride was stifling," said Daisy Bush of Saint Hebron A.M.E. Church in Quincy. Visiting the museum is instrumental in encouraging the culture of yesteryear and secures the spirit of tomorrow, making the CCMCC theme, "Preserving the Past...Building the Future" one of relevance, and devotion.

Rosewood expert shares her family's story of survival

Lizzie Robinson-Jenkins received her charge to keep at the tender age of 5 and has carried forward her mission to the 21st Century.

The former Alachua School teacher was told the story of her relatives' escape from the massacre at Rosewood. Florida in 1922.

From that time on, Robinson-Jenkins has worked to tell her family's story, one of survival

and perseverance. As the leader of the Rosewood Foundation owner John Wright hid fleeing non-profit, she has been working on a book set to be released in January that will correct the misinformation shared in the movie.

Robinson-Jenkins credits the kindness of white citizens for preventing further tragedy in the wake of a senseless event. She said following a woman being beaten by her lover and blaming it on a Black man to

appease her husband, store citizens in his home until Sheriff Bob Walker was able to get them on a train out of town.

Robinson-Jenkins beseeched the EEDLO members in attendance at her special presentation at the Mount Olive A.M.E. Church in Gainesville to visit her website rosewoodflorida.com and support the Rosewood Foundation.
